



Multiplication and Division is a focus at St John's this year. The teachers are always trying to add Multiplication and Division in all their Mathematics lessons. This creates as sense that different mathematical strands are connected. The issue of whether times tables being taught is often brought up. **Times tables are taught**, they are taught in a variety of ways and are not taught just by rote learning. Below is an outline of the multiplicative structures that are taught in our learning spaces and examples of word problems that match each structure.



Multiplicative structure	Multiplication word problem	Division word problem
Equal group structure	Three children have 4 cookies each. How many cookies do they have altogether?	12 cookies are shared equally between 3 friends. How many cookies do they get each?
		(Partition)
Allocation/rate	One sticker costs 5 cents, how much would 3 stickers cost?	I have 30 cents to spend on stickers. If one sticker cost 5 cents how many stickers can I buy?
		(Quotition)
Rectangular arrays	A box of chocolates has 4 chocolates in each row. There are 3 rows of chocolates. How many chocolates are in the box?	I had a box of 12 chocolates. There are 4 chocolates in each row. How many rows of chocolates in the box? (Quotition)
Times as many or multi- plicative comparison	Janie collected 4 seashells. Simone has 3 times as many. How many seashells does Simone have?	Simone collected 12 seashells. This was 3 times as many as Jamie. How many seashells did Jamie have?
		(Partition)
Cartesian product or combination problems	Jess has 3 skirts, and 4 t-shirts, how many different outfits can she wear?	Jess has 1 different skirts and t-shirt outfits to wear. If she has 3 skirts. How many t-shirts does she have?

Numeracy in ES1

Early stage One have been discovering data and different ways they can represent data. The children explored the amount of different coloured M & M's in small packets. The children were then asked to organise the M & M's.







Great Work Early Stage One

Vocabulary Building Ideas

Kids with a large vocabulary understand more of what they read and hear. So big vocabulary=big learning! Exploring new words on a regular basis is one of the best ways parents can support learning at home. Parents are the first "language models" for children. Children listen, then use words,



then read them, and, finally, write them. What they learn at home about words supports success in school.

What parents can do to help at home

Engage your child in conversations every day. If possible, include new and interesting words in your conversation.

Read to your child each day. When the book contains a new or interesting word, pause and define the word for your child. After you're done reading, engage your child in a conversation about the book.

Help build word knowledge by classifying and grouping objects or pictures while naming them.

Help build your child's understanding of language by playing word games and telling jokes and stories.

Encourage your child to read on their own. The more children read, the more words they encounter and learn.

Did You Know???

Word origins or facts about words can be fascinating. For example, the word "salary" had its origin in "salarium," which is Latin for salt. Roman soldiers received their pay in salt.

Suffixes are clues to word meanings. For example, "er" or "or" at the end of a word suggests "one who." Example: conductor-one who conducts; trainer-one who trains, etc.

Parents who talk to their children, and who encourage an interest in words will lay a healthy platform for academic success. And children will quickly realize that words need not be drudgery but can be exciting and interesting.


